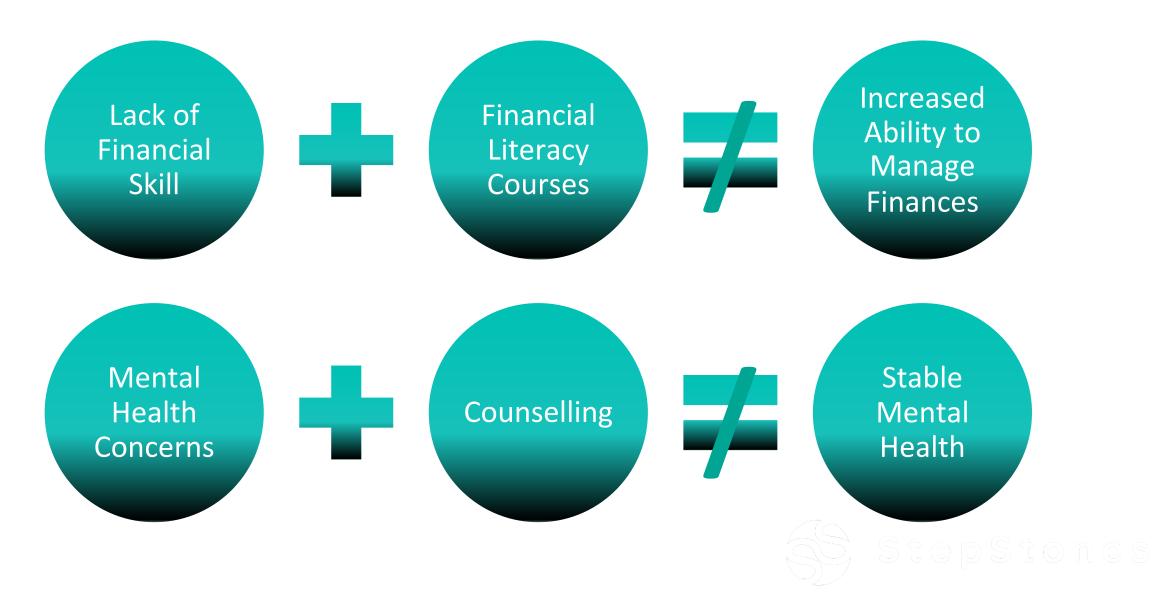

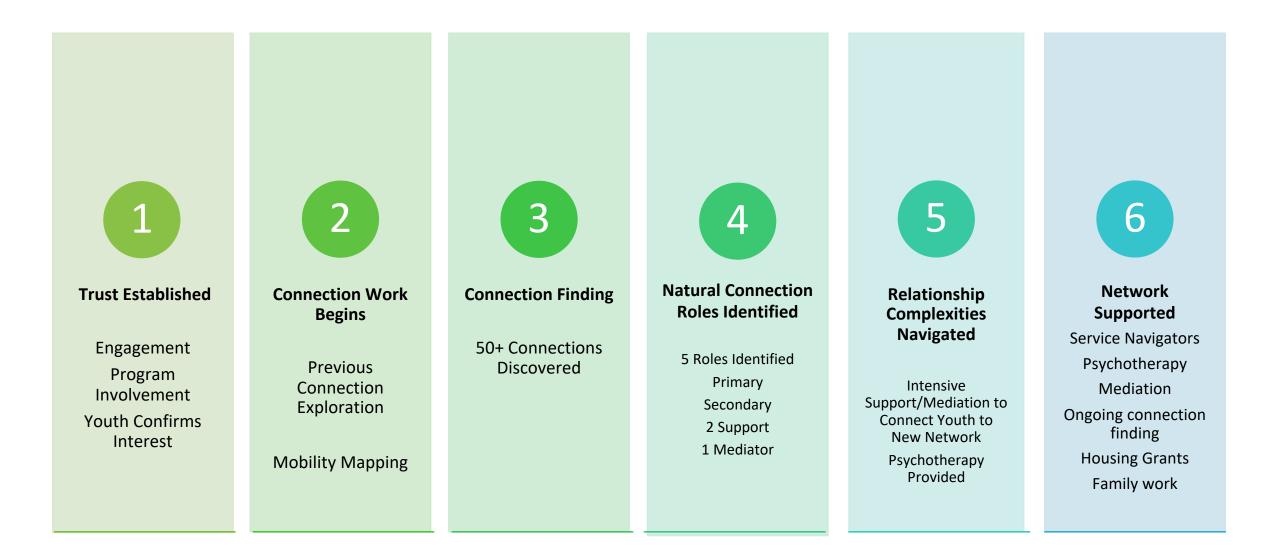

THE STEPSTONES BUILDING CONNECTIONS OUTCOMES

- 59% secured long term housing
- 94% of youth have established long term unpaid supportive relationships in their lives which includes the involvement of a primary support person
- 94% of youth report an increased sense of belonging
- 100% of youth utilized housing support and 28% utilized the housing grants
- 11% utilized mental health counselling support

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STEPSTONES OUTCOMES

With vigorous and intensive intervention and support, youth involved in StepStones' programming achieve the following results:

- 82% have either graduated from high school or are currently attending
- 78% of 18 year old's and older have graduated high school
- 86% have achieved stable housing after 6 months in our program
- 27% are attending post-secondary education after 12 months



How is this approach different from traditional family finding/seeing approaches?

- Relies on developing a community of people rather than one family
- Building a strong support network ensure long term stability because the supporters are supported
- Less reliant on social workers to complete the work
- External to Child Protection which opens up doors (More trust from community members)
- Focuses on community folks rather than family
- Youth can also live in the community and support network still makes a commitment of support
