

Themes

Movin' on:

mourning and loss
group interventions that go beyond life skills training

Emerging adulthood: comparing normative transitions and transitions from care. The importance of peers

International team research: where does Canada stand in relation to policy, practice and research?

The normative transition to adulthood involves losses and gains, which can evoke ambivalence and regression for everyone

The transition to adulthood from care is characterized by multiple losses compounded by the absence of adequate support and relational continuity

Our systems of care are not developmentally informed and err on the side of risk management, which compromises healthy transitions to adulthood

Lessons learned:

Friendships, a precious developmental asset, are not consistently supported in Child Welfare

Most systems of care in Canada do not provide the safety net required for healthy transitions to adulthood

Where Canada stands compared to other countries



Punchlines: We have not progressed significantly since I started

- Without federal legislation, territorial injustices persist and baseline data remains unreliable
- Without universal entitlements well into the second decade of life (an adequate safety net), youth growing up in care in Canada are blocked from reaching their potential
- Without research that shifts the discourse from individual deficits to systemic barriers, including inadequate training in the promotion of developmental assets, we perpetuate stigma and marginalization

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
