The City of Londons Coordinated Access System is striving to achieve the Reaching Home requirements. Our community works collaboratively with Leaders in a multi-sectoral approach to solving chronic homelessness in London. Coordinated Access continues to work with Built for Zero Canada to insure all minimum guideline requirements are met through ongoing monthly engagement meetings. Currently, London's Coordinated Access is working on reviewing all internal coordinated access policy and procedure documentation to insure it is in accordance with Reaching Home and Built for Zero Canada guidelines. The City of London's Coordinated Access supports a yearly prioritization meeting to review and generate local community priorities to insure housing resources are administered to meet the needs of Londoners. Ongoing governance or changes to the Coordinated Access system are brought forward to the London Homless Prevention Network. The City of London's Coordinated Access has increased its service delivery by hiring two full time Client Service Representatives and four full time access coordinators which work to actively prevent and divert homelessness where possible and strive to make the experience of homelessness as short as possible by connecting individuals and families to housing services.








