It is important to note that responding to the impact of COVID-19 in 2020/2021 was the priority for York Region. As such, the work and planning related to the minimum requirements for a Coordinated Access System and HMIS were delayed. More specifically,

#### Governance Structure:

The development of the Coordinated Access System governance structure and relevant policies and protocols is under development and will be done in partnership with the Regional Municipality of York and the York Region Homelessness Community Advisory Board. It is a focus for 2021/2022.

#### Access Points to Service:

There was some preliminary thinking and work done by the Reaching Home Planning and Implementation Committee, a sub-committee of YRHCAB, but this was put on hold due to the COVID-19 pandemic. As such, York Region Homelessness Community Advisory Board (YRHCAB) feels that we need to revisit and expand upon some of this initial work. More importantly, we will work with the Regional Municipality of York to fully develop the coordinated access model for York Region and consult with community stakeholders on this model. This work is planned for 2021-2022.

### Triage and Assessment:

The work in this area and meeting the minumum requirements will follow once we have a coordinated access model in place.





Responding to the impact of COVID-19 in 2020-2021 and the first half of 2021-2022 has been the priority in York Region. Additionally, we have seen an increase in the number of person's experiencing homelessness over the course of the pandemic and require the time to understand if this is a one time trend or on-going. As such, the work and planning related to setting minimum requirements for a CAS and HMIS has been delayed.

## Outcome #2: Fewer people experience homelessness for the first time (new inflows into homelessness are reduced)



A 75% increase was observed in the number of people experiencing homelessness for the first time in March 2021 compared to March 2020. Contributing factors may include financial hardships experienced by low income households due to the COVID-19 pandemic and limited available housing options. Responding to the impact of COVID-19 in 2020-2021 and the first half of 2021-2022 has been the priority in York Region. Additionally, we have seen an increase in the number of person's experiencing homelessness over the course of the pandemic and require the time to understand if this is a one time trend or on-going. As such, the work and planning related to setting minimum requirements for a CAS and HMIS has been delayed.

# Outcome #3: Fewer people return to homelessness from housing (returns to homelessness are reduced)



Responding to the impact of COVID-19 in 2020-2021 and the first half of 2021-2022 has been the priority in York Region. Additionally, we have seen an increase in the number of person's experiencing homelessness over the course of the pandemic and require the time to understand if this is a one time trend or on-going. As such, the work and planning related to setting minimum requirements for a CAS and HMIS has been delayed.

# Outcome #4: Fewer Indigenous peoples experience homelessness (Indigenous homelessness is reduced)



A 12% increase was observed in the number of indigenous people experiencing homelessness in March 2021 compared to March 2020. Responding to the impact of COVID-19 in 2020-2021 and the first half of 2021-2022 has been the priority in York Region. In Q4 of 2020-2021, York Region implemented its first every Indigneous led services for Indigenous people experiencing homelessness. It is critical that we allow this program time to develop before we set the targets for this outcome to ensure that we have a more accurate reflection of this population in York Region.
