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1. Community Engagement

Please identify the steps taken to engage your community stakeholders in developing this plan.¹

An advisory group comprising of stakeholders and Indigenous leaders from the homelessness serving sector was formed to guide the development of the engagement process for the Community Plan. It was determined that while facilitating feedback from all areas of Winnipeg, the community engagement process had to maximize input from those currently experiencing homelessness and those with lived experience of homelessness.

Methods of engagement included discussion groups; an on-line survey; a targeted outreach campaign; and an environmental scan of existing community plans and related research. This was presented to and approved by the Community Advisory Board (CAB).

The Community Entity contracted two Indigenous consultants to facilitate the discussion groups, ensuring that the cultural lens, perspectives and approach were utilized in setting up the process of engagement with discussion group participants and the analysis of the results.

Discussion groups – 6 sessions were held between August 28 – September 6, 2019. Groups included individuals with lived experience from the following people: women, youth, 2SLGBTQ+, Indigenous peoples, and people living with Disabilities. A total of 51 participants attended the discussion groups.

Surveys – the Community Entity coordinated an online survey which was completed by 342 respondents (267 individuals and 75 organizations).

Outreach – the Community Entity partnered with two outreach organizations (Main Street Project and Mama Bear Clan) who work directly with those living in tents and those unsheltered. A total of 99 people who are currently homeless and who do not access shelters were reached and provided input to the Community Plan.

Environmental scan - reviewed 36 research documents, reports and community neighbourhood plans produced in the last five years. These were assessed against the Reaching Home priorities to identify alignment and identify additional Winnipeg specific priorities.

End Homelessness Winnipeg (EHW) intends to draw on the experiences and partnerships developed through the consultation process to increase the meaningful engagement of Indigenous community members and those represented in the discussion groups and outreach in the development of future program initiatives (Coordinated Access, Point-in-Time counts, Build for Zero, etc.).

EHW will review these investment targets annually with the CAB and the Community Sector Leadership Council to maximize the effective allocation of Reaching Home investments and measurable outcomes.

4. Coordinated Access

Please discuss the steps you will take to implement a coordinated access system in your community. If your community has a coordinated access system in place, please describe how it presently functions.

End Homelessness Winnipeg (EHW) is moving forward to implement Coordinated Access for Winnipeg and expand the Homeless Individuals and Families Information System (HIFIS) as the sector wide data collection platform.

Though, under Reaching Home directives, this is only mandatory under the Designated stream of funding, EHW will work with organizations funded through the Indigenous stream and non-Reaching Home funded Indigenous stakeholders to promote full participation in Coordinated Access. Currently 50 per cent of Reaching Home funded homelessness projects are implemented by Indigenous organizations representing a significant component of the community's shared response to homelessness. As a recognized Indigenous organization, EHW is well positioned to bridge the two funding streams of Reaching Home and maximize the inclusion of Indigenous stakeholders in moving the priorities of Reaching Home forward.

In 2019 EHW assumed administrative responsibility for the HIFIS platform used by the three primary emergency shelters and the separate HIFIS platform used for the centralized intake of Housing First. EHW is actively working to integrate the two systems while working to bring on board new community organizations. This will form a foundational component of Coordinated Access.



EHW is currently connecting with other Community Entities across Canada who started the process towards Coordinated Access in 2019 to research existing models of governance and infrastructure. Once this process is complete EHW will be able to provide Service Canada and CAB with a detailed implementation plan including timelines and milestone targets. (November 12 CAB meeting).

EHW will form an Advisory Committee of key stakeholders, Indigenous leaders, CAB members, representation from the Community Sector Leadership Council and those with personal experience of homelessness, to guide EHW in implementing a system of Coordinated Access by:

- Establishing a governance structure that is inclusive, equitable and facilitates the establishment of an effective Coordinated Access infrastructure for Winnipeg.
- Developing Terms of Reference for Coordinated Access that clearly defines roles and responsibilities for all parties.
- Establishing time related targets and outcomes.
- Developing accountability and privacy policies.
- Defining a model of access, assessment, prioritization criteria, and referral processes.
- Developing a strategy to broaden Coordinated Access to include all relevant services and programs including community-based organizations, institutions and government departments.

EHW staff will oversee the implementation and ongoing maintenance of HIFIS. This will include establishing data governance framework, planning to address privacy issues, security procedures, and provide technical training and support to organizations.

Sector wide implementation of HIFIS and establishment of Coordinated Access is expected to be fully operational by March 2022.

The transition to a system of Coordinated Access will be supported by the development of a "By Name List" which will increase the sectors ability to monitor system usage and identify potential service gaps to be address in the development of the Coordinated Access infrastructure.

5. Community-Wide Outcomes

In support of federally mandated outcomes, EHW will be asking organizations applying for Reaching Home funding to identify in the application how their project will contribute to the target reduction in chronic homelessness and/or reduce the inflow into homelessness within Winnipeg.

EHW will lead a process with the CAB, Community Sector Leadership Council and stakeholders to identify annual measurable outcome-based milestones necessary to achieve the targeted 50% reduction in chronic homelessness by 2027/28 or sooner.



Throughout the 2019/20 project year, EHW has been working with funded organizations to clearly define measurable project-specific outcomes. This will assist in the review of future funding requests and lays the groundwork for a paradigm shift within the sector to community-wide measurable outcomes.

The consultation process implemented by EHW to develop this Community Plan collected a depth of additional data and input from community members that required further analysis.

EHW will provide a report to those that provided input, the community and Service Canada, which will detail results in addition to identifying Winnipeg-specific priorities and associated measurable outcomes.

EHW will then work with the CAB, Community Sector Leadership Council and stakeholders to define appropriate community specific outcome measures.

6. Official Language Minority Communities

End Homelessness Winnipeg is committed to ensuring the information needs of OLMCs are addressed in the administration of Reaching Home. We will continue to monitor and respond to demands for services in minority languages to ensure equal access to the Reaching Home strategy.

As with the survey documents for soliciting community input for the Reaching Home Community Plan, EHW will continue to translate documents to French whenever necessary.

When individuals require translation support to access services, EHW will work with Winnipeg Regional Health Authority to provide such supports.

EHW will assist sub-project organizations to satisfy OLMC requirements where necessary.

EHW will support the CAB and Service Canada to ensure OLMC representation within the CAB whenever possible.
