Halton's Region's Community Advisory Board (CAB) is entirely centered around supporting the implementation of Coordinated Access. The CAB has been kept up to date with all work related to Coordinated Access development and has been consulted where appropriate to provide feedback on any new elements to support Coordinated Access, especially through Halton's use of COTS as the local HMIS. The CAB has had the opportunity to provide feedback and support work being done around implementation of Coordinated Access and the local HMIS. Halton Region began this journey in 2018 through participating in an Environmental Scan of Indigenous Homelessness in Halton. Through this undertaking Halton Region was able to gain connections with Indigenous groups as noted in the report. Halton Region has continued to engage with groups following this report. In addition to this, Halton Region has brought aboard an Indigenous Advisor as an added layer of support to further engagement in the community with all Regional work. In Halton Region staff also had the opportunity to participate in Indigenous learning in 2022 through the 4 Seasons of Reconciliation offered through the First Nations University of Canada. As noted elsewhere, there are currently no Indigenous social services agencies providing services in Halton Region and we would like to request Federal assistance for funding to take this next step in Indigenous reconciliation.

Both non-Indigenous groups and Indigenous groups have the opportunity to contribute to the CHR through the Community Advisory Board. In 2023 Halton Region will continue to work alongside the Regional Indigenous Advisor to further relationship building and engagement in the community with Indigenous groups. As noted elsewhere, there are currently no Indigenous social services agencies providing services in Halton Region and we would like to request Federal assistance for funding to take this next step in Indigenous reconciliation.

Halton Region would like to note that outstanding questions related to the DSA were only answered by Service Canada in September 2022. Halton Region is now engaged with signing the DSA, and will be returning it to Service Canada in short order.

#### **Summary Comment**

Are there particular efforts and/or issues that you would like to highlight for this reporting period related to your community's work to transition to an outcomes-based approach under Reaching Home?

Efforts to maintain Halton's By-Name List has been very administratively heavy. Maintenance of the By-Name List requires the efforts of multiple staff members to keep the list up to date and accurate on a daily basis. Increase efforts at the end of the month are underway to capture all necessary data points from the By-Name List and this requires a significant amount of staff time.


Over the coming year Halton Region will be working on scaling it's HMIS to generate a By-Name List without extracting data that requires manual manipulation in excel. Work is underway to automate the By-Name List through Halton's local HMIS, with the ability to track all critical elements of a By-Name List, including the ability to generate monthly and annual data reporting.

Over the last year the By-Name List has become an imperative element to service planning at the person level, and strategic planning at the system level. Halton Region is using the By-Name List daily to support service plans for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. The By-Name List is heavily relied upon to effectively clients to appropriate housing and to provide the right level of support to clients while they are homeless. On a system level, Halton Region has been able to extract data from the By-Name List to share with the Community Advisory Board as a means of reporting back on how Halton is doing with capturing system level data on homelessness in Halton Region. Sharing of this data has been able to support local agencies to identify gaps in services and direct funding appropriately. Early By-Name List data has also provided the context to Halton around service gaps and where additional efforts and funding resources may be required.






